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## **1. ROLE OF LOCAL GOVERNMENT DEPARTMENT**

### **1.1 Administrative and Fiscal Support to Various Tiers of Local Governments**

During the early days of the new Local Government system Local Government Department helped the Revenue Department in the delimitation process for creation of District Governments, TMAs and union councils, also filled up the posts of TMOs, TOs and Secretaries of Union Councils by drawing personnel from the SCUG, RDD, PHED, LGD and defunct councils. The Sindh Local Government Board has been reconstituted and reorganized to cater to the requirements of the new system (Annexure-A). The board deals with the service matters of SCUG personnel's and posting and transfer of RDD and PHED personnel. The Board facilitated the newly created Local Governments in running day-to-day business by issuing circulars, guidelines and notifications.

A committee was constituted by the Local Government Department to work out an interim fiscal award for the 18 TMAs of Karachi, which were carved out of the five defunct District Municipal Administrations. The previously existing shares of defunct KMC and defunct DMCs were in the ratio of 67: 33. Since the management of medical, health and educational institutions was entrusted to City District Government Karachi therefore the share of City District Government was raised to 52% as against the 48% for the towns. The Province Finance Commission upon its creation endorsed this interim award.

A Cell has been established in the Sindh Local Government Board, which is responsible to work out the fiscal need of the TMAs and UAs. The cell gets feed back from the Local Governments and recommends the proposed shares to the PFC.

### **1.2 Human Resource Management for the offices of City District Government, Karachi, TMAs and UAs**

The defunct District Council Karachi and defunct KMC have been succeeded by the City District Government Karachi as such their historical share of OZT was allocated to the CDGK. The defunct KMC and District Council were administered by officers / officials of SCUG service. New titles under the present system have been assigned to the previously existing posts and officers / officials are posted by the Sindh Local Government Board

according to the cadres viz administration, Accounts, Engineering, Medical and Health. Doctors belonging the SCUG service manned the hospitals and health units managed by KMC and DMC. These doctors were divided into three cadres i.e. General, Specialist and Health Cadre. The function of sanitation has been entrusted to TMAs through Town Officers (Infrastructure). Consequently the doctors belonging the health cadre have been merged with Medical Cadre and have been posted in CDGK against original SCUG slots.

There were 102 TMAs in the province with 18 Town Municipal Administrations in Karachi and 84 Taluka Municipal Administrations elsewhere in the province. The Local Government Department, has worked out a new schedule of establishment for managing the administration of the Local Governments. This new arrangement inter alia entails posts of TMOs in Karachi Towns, Hyderabad City, Mirpurkhas, Sukkur, Larkana in BS 19 TMOs of other district headquarters TMAs in BS 18 and TMOs of other TMAs in BS 17. A list of all 119 TMAs is attached as Annexure-B.

Keeping in view the dictates of SLGO 2001 the Local Government Department, through PTW and Sindh Civil Services Academy Tando Jam arranged a number of training programs for the members of SCUG service in all disciplines. The Department has also worked out new syllabi in keeping with the new law and rules.

### **1.3 Secretariat of Local Government Commission**

A Regulatory Wing (Secretariat) of Sindh Local Government Commission has been created which is headed by Director General. The commission with the support of the secretariat firms up its recommendations, which are routed through the additional secretary Sindh Local Government Commission at the Local Government Department for action or onward transmission to the Chief Executive of the Province.

### **1.4 Supervise / Co-ordinate Devolution and Transition Related Matter**

A Provincial Transition Wing has been established in the Local Government Department headed by Chief Provincial Transition Wing in addition to framing and notifying four sets of rules facilitated the Local Governments in matters relating to distribution of immovable and

removable properties, establishment of offices of Local Governments, formation of CCBs, Mushawirat Committees, Village & Neighborhood Councils and removal of difficulties, if any.

### **1.5 Coordinate, supervise and monitor Provincial, Foreign Aided and Mega Projects**

Project Monitoring and Evaluation cell (PMEC) has been established under a Director who reports to the Secretary Local Government Department and monitors and supervises provincial, foreign-aided and mega projects. A number of mega projects sponsored by donor agencies, World Bank and Asian Development Bank are underway in District Governments and TMAs. The PMEC also coordinates with SDSSP and DSP in all such matters.

### **1.6 Supervise and Coordinate the Capacity Building for Local Governments**

The Sindh Local Governments and Rural Development Academy Tando Jam has been upgraded and renamed as Civil Services Academy. A number of training programs and capacity building seminars/Workshops have been conducted by the Academy to enhance the capacity levels of all the stakeholders including elected representatives. In addition PTW and Local Government Department conducted trainings, capacity building courses, seminars and workshops in collaboration with NRB and NIPA.

### **1.7 Frame Rules, Regulations and policies under the Sindh Local Government Ordinance-2001 and other related enactments**

The Local Government Department through Sindh Local Government Board framed as many as 9 rules in the nascent days of the new system and issued many circulars, regulations notifications and policy guidelines to the Local Governments and Amendments have been made in The Local Government Ordinance on the recommendation of Local Government Department. These amendments were necessitated due to difficulties faced by the Local Governments and the feedback received from them. Six more rules, in collaboration with Decentralization Support Program are in the process of validation.

## **1.8 Liaison with District Governments, TMAs and UAs**

The Local Government have posted Local Government Support Officers at every District headquarter to liaise with three Tiers of Local Governments. The LGSOs are required to collect and supply vital information to the Local Government Department and are the field officers for SLGC in its deliberations. They have also been delegated powers under the rules as Authorized Officers for officials up to BS 11 of SCUG service.

## **1.9 Coordination in the Matters Related to Audit and Accounts of TMAs and UAs**

The pre-audit of the TMAs and UAs is conducted by the Provincial Local Fund Audit Department. Annual Audit Reports and Audit Requisitions are also received by the Local Government Department, which are examined and scrutinized by a cell established for the purpose.

## **1.10 Grant-in-Aid of Local Governments**

The self-proposing shares of Local Governments from GST are also examined & scrutinized by LG Department. These proposals are received from financially weak Local Governments and if found appropriate are recommended to the PFC. Matters of conditional grants are dealt and examined by PMEC.

## **1.11 Judicial Powers for Local Councils**

Recently the TMOs were given powers to check price hike of essential Commodities particularly during the holy month of Ramazan and unlawful dinners at wedding ceremonies. Power under Food Adulteration Ordinance and other minor acts have been delegated to various officers working in Local Governments. These are given at Annexure C & D.

## **1.12 Matters Relating to Katchi Abadis**

The Kachi Abadis authority is working under the Local Government Department, which inter alia deals with regularization of Katchi Abadies in the province. It is headed by a Director General.

The functions of Local Government department also include vetting of taxation proposals of the Local Governments and approval of self-financing schemes proposed by them. All pending matters, petitions, lawsuits and disciplinary matters prior to promulgation of SLGO 2001 are also dealt with by the Local Government Department.

## **2. PRESENT STATUS OF DEVOLUTION**

Many of the issues pertaining to the process of Devolution have been resolved, but still there are many to be addressed with alacrity. A few unresolved issues are given as under: -

### **2.1 Distribution / entrustment of staff**

Section 53 (6) of Sindh Local Government Ordinance 2001 and Section 52 provide for the distribution of staff and entrustment of devolved provincial departments to Local Government in accordance with functions. The DCOs of District Governments were appointed chief transition officers to place the staff of defunct district council and Union councils to the respective Local Government. This matter hitherto remains unresolved. Similarly the staff of dissolved RDD and PHED have not been fully entrusted to TMAs. The salaries of employees of defunct councils are being paid from the local fund by the district government without assignment of duties. The recovery staff of dissolved district councils and union councils must be entrusted to TMAs along with the share of salaries. Similarly those who were performing duties in the health and educational institutions must go to the district governments along with their share of salaries. Now the Local Government has embarked upon an exercise to make sure that bottlenecks in formation of District and TMA cadres are resolved.

## **2.2 Creation of district cadre**

SLGO-2001 provides for creation of district and Taluka / Town cadres and it was incumbent upon the government to ensure such creation by the 31<sup>st</sup> December 2005. The Local Government department has now taken up cudgels albeit they have certain reservations for which they have sought clarifications / guidelines from NRB and hopefully the formation of district and taluka/town cadres will be finalized shortly.

## **2.3 Entrustment of market committees to TMAs**

Section 54 (nn) provides for establishment and management of markets by the TMAs. The Provincial Agriculture Department is still managing the market committees formed under the Punjab Agriculture produce Act 1940. These market committees are supposed to be entrusted to TMAs for which the Local Government department has been hankering ever since the inception of the new system but the agriculture department is dithering and demurring to let it off the hook. The matter is pending with cabinet. It is hoped that the matter will be the resolved soon.

## **2.4 Updating & framing of rules**

In the early days of the present system, the Sindh Local Government Board framed as many as 9 rules to set the ball rolling. These rules were in fact extensions of previously existing rules only infirmities and inconsistencies were removed. These rules have facilitated the Local Governments in the running of their day-to-day business smoothly. Now that the Local Government ordinance has undergone many amendments the updating of Contract Rules, APT Rules, Imposition of Taxes Rules and deletion of Conduct of Business Rules has become expedient. The conduct of business rules have since been deleted, the imposition of taxes rules have been customized by adding chapters on recovery of taxes and auction of leases and renamed as taxation rules and are in the final stages of validation. Similarly the decentralization support program in collaboration with the Local Government department has taken up framing of the public private partnership rules, the regulation of site development schemes rules, the monitoring rules, the PFC rules of business and the conduct of the

inspections rules which are in the final stages of validation. The exercise will be complete once steps are taken to get the following rules framed i.e the Work Rules, Employees Performance, Incentives And Bonuses Rules, Development Authorities Rules and Procurement Rules.

The City District Government Karachi has framed Procurement Manual, which with modifications can be converted into the Procurement Rules for Local Governments. The Local Government are still following the age old work rules 1969 framed under the municipal administration ordinance 1960. A vast majority of these rules are blatantly inconsistent with SLGO 2001. The framing of work rules under SLGO 2001 therefore needs to be taken up on priority.

## **2.5 Streamlining the performance of monitoring committees, Mushawarat Committees & Musalihat Anjuman**

The validation of draft Monitoring Rules is on the anvil, which will greatly facilitate and improve the performance of monitoring committees. Various inspection reports of SLGC revealed that the existing Monitoring Committees in the Local Governments are either not delivering the goods or have been exceeding the limitations provided in the law. The monitoring committee rules will take care of the aberrations being faced presently. In the same vein the Mushawarat committees and at some places the Musalihat Anjumans are not performing upto the mark. These issues can be addressed by a monitoring system to be evolved by the government. In addition to the internal monitoring system of Local Governments, which will hopefully be taken care of by the draft monitoring rules, which are in final stages of validation.

## **2.6 Implementation of delegation of financial and administrative powers**

The District Coordination Officers have been delegated financial administrative powers but some of those have not been delegated to the EDOs, DOs and DDOs, which cause slight obfuscation. The SLGC, PTW and the Local Government Department have recommended that powers commensurate with their functions be delegated to EDOs, DOs and DDOs.

Furthermore vide notification No; SO (C-I)(SGA&CD)/4-52/2006 dated 15<sup>th</sup> June 2006 by the chief secretary a monitoring and evaluation committee has been constituted which will inter-alia carryout a detailed review of the administrative and financial powers devolved to the local governments Annexure-E.

The T.O.R's of the Committee are as under: -

1. To carry out a detailed review of the administrative and financial powers devolved to the Local Governments in terms of
  - (a) Adequacy of the powers to enable effective functioning of Local Governments Knowledge. Understanding and relevance of these powers at the Local Government level
  - (b) Identification of major issues in relation to implementation and exercise of devolved powers.
  
2. To recommend specific actions that will resolve issues and remove hindrances to create a more enabling environment for LGs. Including recommendations on creating institutional interfaces minimizing duality of responsibility and overlap and requisite legislative amendments.
  - (a) To identify the methodologies, instruments, benchmarks for measuring progress and provide timelines and costs associated with phase I and phase II activities
  - (b) To propose a mechanism for transition from Phase I to II activities.
  - (c) To recommend strategies, institutional mechanisms and approaches for regular M&E exercises in relation to management functions.

## **2.7 Lifting of ban on recruitments**

Under section 184 for SLGO a ban was imposed on recruitment during the transition period, which culminated in June 2002. A ban on recruitment by provincial government is also in place since last 15 years. During this period many employees of defunct local councils (now entrusted to the Local Governments) have retired thereby creating huge voids coupled with this there has been an enormous increase in population and unplanned growth of local areas. The TMA/UA APT Rules have given powers of appointments to the TMAs but all recruitments are being made with

the permission of the government on contract basis. A system needs to be devised to fill the voids for recruitment of skilled, qualified and deserving personnel's on merit.

## **2.8 Reconstruction of civil services**

Rule 3 (4) of the Town/Taluka municipal administration Rules of Business provides for reconstruction of civil services. The Local Government system is in its sixth year of existence. The various Local Governments have recast their respective schedules of establishment. Only the employees of dissolved/devolved departments have not been placed properly. The Local Government departments now have taken up exercises which will guarantee complete reconstruction of civil services and this will also help creation of District and Taluka cadres in right earnest.

## **2.9 Existing Basic Urban Services And Opportunities For Improvement**

The Basic amenities including water Supply, Sewerage & Drainage & Solid Waste Management are far from being upto the required standards particularly in view of Sprawling Shanty towns (Kachi Abadi). The lowest income groups, especially women and children, face serious problems in meeting their needs.

Keeping the above situation in mind six project towns- Badin, Dadu, Khairpur, Mithi/ Islam Kot, Naushehro Feroze & Sanghar- were selected in the meeting of a steering committee on urban these towns were held by the committee to be the most vulnerable for example the existing water supply in these towns were found to be severely stretched and inadequate. There was no water treatment system in place and the water was bound to be contaminated by sewerage. Shortage of technical staff and funds was scepter, which haunted these towns the solid Waste Management, is an issue of growing concern of the rapidly increasing population towns a plausible solution was to decrease the TMA scope of work to focus on the operation and maintenance (O&M) of the main water works and distribution lines, wastewater collection and disposal infrastructure, and a core solid waste collation and disposal system-leaving lane level O&M of the sewage drain network and sold waste management to individual neighborhoods organized as Neighborhood Development Associations (NDA) consisting of 50-200 household (HH). Such a partnership between the

TMA and NDAs will not only enhance the ability of TMAs to reliably supply services to the towns, but also potentially free up TMA resources for the rest of the taluka.

### 2.9.1 The Project

The Sindh Basic Urban Services Project (SBUSP) has been launched to improve drinking water supplies, Sewage/ Waste water Disposal and Solid Waste Disposal in the six towns.

The Project has the three following three components:

- i. Integrated Municipal Infrastructure Component.
- ii. Neighborhood Development Component.
- iii. Capacity Development and Project Implementation Support component.

### 2.9.2 Cost Estimated And Financing Plan

The total cost of the Project is estimated at US\$66.3 Million equivalent, including US\$4.3 Million equivalent as taxes and duties, US\$8.4 equivalent as physical and price contingencies, and US\$0.7 Million as capitalized interest during construction period.

The Government of Pakistan (GOP) will request a Loan OF \$49.5 million from ADB's Asian Development Fund (ADF). The ADF loan will have a term of 32 years, including a grace period of 8 years. GOP will relent the ADB Funds to the Sindh Provincial Government (SPG) on the same terms and conditions. SPG will bear the foreign exchange risk and make the loan proceeds available, as special grant, to TMAs through LGD under the Provincial Finance Commission (PFC), which was set up under SLGO 2001 to facilitate fiscal transfers to district governments, TMAs, and union administrations.

### 2.9.3 Implementation Arrangements

The executive agency will be Local Government Department, which will establish a Project Coordination Unit and the central for managing monitoring and reporting, a project steering committee for project over view and policy guidance under the chairmanship of Additional Chief Secretary Planning and Development Department

The implementing agency will be the concerned TMA. The implementation the period the five years starting in 2007 the Project Coordination Unit will hire international and national consultant to assist in over all management of the project.

#### 2.9.4 Project Benefits And Beneficiaries

The benefits and impacts of the Project will be: (i) increased coverage of water supply, sewerage and drainage and solid waste management services, including to the poor; (ii) improved cost recovery though better service delivery; (iii) improved public health; (iv) strengthening of institutional capabilities in urban planning and management, and in overall governance; (v) strengthening of community participation and empowerment (vi) economic opportunities, creation of employment, and poverty reduction; and (vii) reduction of environmental degradation and natural resources depletion.

### **2.10 Development of draft Water Supply & Sanitation and Solid Waste Management policies developed under SDSSP**

The Asian Development Bank engaged the Halcrow consultants who were facilitated by Sindh Local Government Department Government for the preparation of Drinking Water & Sanitation and Solid Waste Management Policies for the Province.

Halcrow submitted draft policy of Water Supply and Sanitation to Local Government Department. It was reviewed by all the stakeholders in the process and finally the draft policy was published in leading newspaper for the information of general public to invite suggestions for the improvement of draft policy.

After the review of the policy the Halcrow consultants revised the draft policy and submitted it to Local Government Department. The final draft will now be submitted from Local Government Department to the competent forum for approval. Thereafter the approved policy shall be implemented in the province of Sindh.

## **2.11 Salient Feature of Sindh Policy for Water Supply & Sewerage and Solid Waste Management**

The Sindh Domestic Water Supply & Sewerage Policy and Solid Waste Management Policy is intended to support and guide the Sindh City District Government and Town/Taluka Municipal Administration (TMAs) to frame their own domestic water supply and Sewerage and Solid Waste Management strategies, plans and programmes and is the result of stakeholder consultations held at the Taluka and provincial levels. The salient features of the policy are as under:

1. To ensure a clean, healthy and pollution free environment in all settlements.
2. To ensure the safe handling and disposal of solid waste and the promotion of health and hygiene practices to compliment the primary objectives.
3. To develop guidelines for the evolution of an effective institutional and financial framework to implement the primary objectives.
4. To link SWM programmes with environment, housing, water and sanitation and city and regional planning policies and programmes.
5. To ensure access to safe drinking water, and the promotion of health and hygiene practices.
6. To ensure an open-defecation-free environment; the safe handling and disposal of liquid waste; and the promotion of health and hygiene practices to compliment the primary objectives.
7. To develop guidelines for the evolution of an effective institutional and financial framework to implement the primary objectives.
8. To link water supply and sanitation programmes with environment, housing, sanitation and city and regional planning policies and programmes.

## **3.0 CAPACITY MAPPING OF TMAs**

Under the administrative order issued on 31 May 2002, the Local Government Department notified rules called “Sindh Taluka Municipal Administration Rules of Business, 2002.” As the title of rules suggests, the rules defined the business and functioning of TMAs.

### **3.1 Description of Key Offices**

A brief description of each major office, is as follows:

#### **3.1.1 Taluka Municipal Officer (TMO)**

Under the rules, the Taluka Municipal Officer (TMO) was designated as “Chief Officer,” who would be overall in-charge of the taluka and, would deal with subjects like water supply, sewerage, drainage, sanitation, solid waste, roads, streets, street lights, parks, playground and, would deal with other service delivery functions.

#### **3.1.2 Taluka Officer (Municipal Regulations)**

The Taluka Officer (Municipal Regulations), under the rules, shall be in-charge of the municipal regulations office and, shall be responsible for licensing, management of municipal lands, estates, properties and enforcement of municipal laws, rules and regulations.

#### **3.1.3 Taluka Officer (Infrastructure and Services)**

Taluka Officer (Infrastructure and Services) shall be responsible for water supply, sanitation, drainage, solid waste, roads, street, streetlights, fire fighting, and other functions.

#### **3.1.4 Taluka Officer (Planning)**

The Taluka Officer (Planning) shall be responsible for spatial planning, land-use control, building control and coordination of development plans with Union Councils.

#### **3.1.5 Taluka Officer (Finance)**

The Taluka Officer (Finance) shall be responsible for budget, revenue accounts and other similar functions.

Prior to devolution, the technical functions, as they relate to infrastructure and utilities, were handled by centrally located departments, which were relatively well staffed, technically. After the municipal and technical functions were devolved to TMAs, they experienced some deficiencies in smooth handling of the basic services.

## **4.0**

### **Capacity Building**

Appropriate capacity building of TMAs is essential for the rational planning and implementation of development programs and projects. Preliminary reviews of the working of TMAs reveal some deficiency in data collection, analysis, presentation, management, comprehension of administrative and technical issues and, ability to document the issues and activities.

The government, recognizing the problems of deficiencies in the TMAs' smooth handling of technical works, took certain appropriate measures. The local government department devolved key support staff from BS-1 to BS-15 to the TMAs. Officers of grade 16 and above were posted in TMAs as TMOs/Town Officers for guiding and supervising the development process and other activities. Mapping of the staff currently working in TMAs as TMOs and TOs (I&S) (Annexure-A) is indicative of the government resolve to equip the TMAs with adequate technical support. Recently, to further provide technical assistance to the TMAs, the government has created District Support Units (DSUs) headed by a grade-18 officer at every district and offices headed by a grade-19 officer at Hyderabad, Sukkur, Mirpurkhas and Larkana. These officers will assist TMAs in the planning and execution of works of water and sanitation. This will be further supported by posting of grade-18 officers (mid-level managers) in all major towns of Sindh.

#### **4.1 Local Government and SDSSP Initiative**

Local Government Department and SDSSP plan to initiate capacity building programs in the field of water, sanitation, solid waste management and environment. Currently, two-fold strategy is in the pipeline. One, a series of workshops would be held, to identify the problems and analyze the existing situation and sensitize the TMAs of the issues involved in the related technical fields, such as safe water supply, scientific disposal of liquid and solid waste, identification and development of landfill sites, garbage transfer stations, etc. This would be supported by distributing technical material and possibly training modules. Second, local educational institutions will be contacted (these are located in Karachi, Hyderabad and Nawabshah), who would, at a cost, conduct 3 to 4 weeks' shortcourses in the field of water, sanitation solid waste and environment. The shortcourse would train the TMAs' staff in the areas like planning of scheme, design of scheme, operation and maintenance of the scheme. This is expected to improve significantly the capacities of TMAs to handle the basic service sectors, and improve the master plans of water supply and sanitation, already prepared by the TMAs.

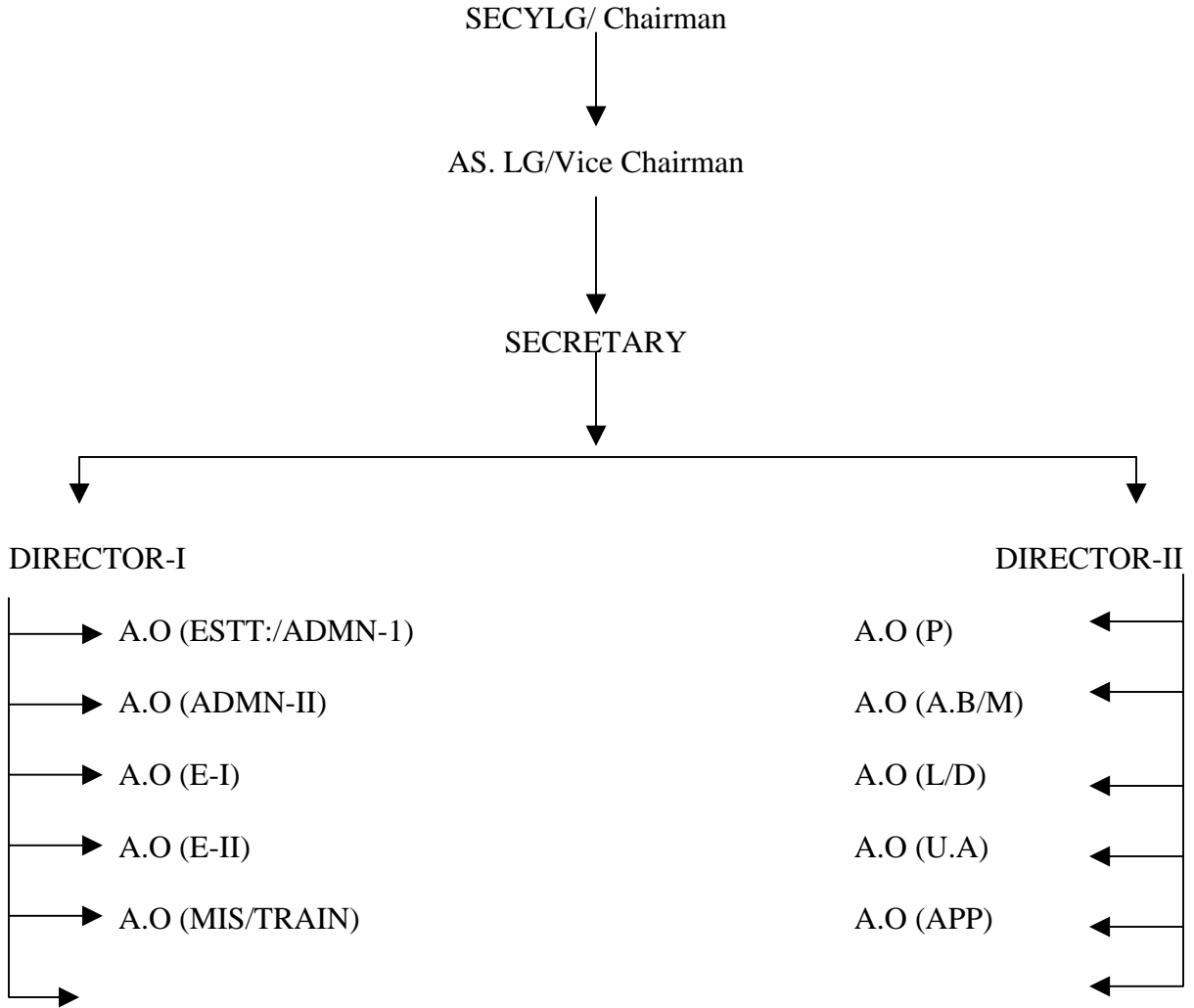

Order No. 1 of 1999;

AND WHEREAS, the Governor of Sindh is satisfied that circumstances exist  
which render it necessary to take immediate action;

NOW, THEREFORE, in pursuance of the aforesaid Proclamation and the  
Provisional Constitution Order read with Provisional Constitution (Amendment) Order No.  
9 of 1999, and in exercise of all powers enabling him in that behalf, the Governor of Sindh  
is pleased to make and promulgate the following Ordinance:-

**1: SHORT TITLE AND COMMENCEMENT.**

**AND WHEREAS** the Provincial Assembly stands dissolved in pursuance of the Proclamation of the fourteenth day of October, 1999 and the Provisional Constitution Order No.1 of 1999;

**AND WHEREAS** the Governor of Sindh is satisfied that circumstances exist which render it necessary to take immediate action;

**NOW, THEREFORE,** in pursuance of the aforesaid Proclamation and the Provisional Constitution read with Provisional Constitution (amendment) Order No.9 of 1999, and in exercise of all powers enabling him in that behalf, the Governor of Sindh is pleased to make and promulgate the following Ordinance:-

**1: SHORT TITLE AND COMMENCEMENT**

- (1) This Ordinance may be called the Sindh Development Authorities Laws (Repeal) Ordinance, 2002.
- (2) It shall come into force on and from 1<sup>st</sup> July, 2002.
